ments by Alice Parker, Robert Shaw, Jack Hal-loran, Larry Fleming and Gene Puerling.

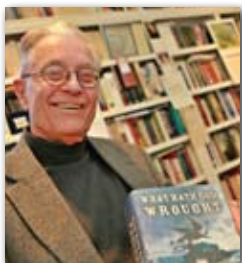


Joanna Dunlap Cowden Memorial Lecture

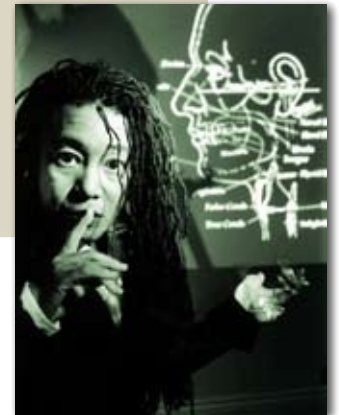
